Proposed re-development of existing bed/sit holiday accommodation.

Thank you for your notification of 8th August.

I share boundaries with the applicant and two other properties all situated on a steep hillside and in very close proximity to each other. Despite these limitations, a high degree of mutual privacy has existed for many years. For the following reasons, I feel that the above proposal will have an adverse effect on my privacy:-

(1) Loss of privacy.

This will result from the change of use of the applicants garage to a lounge, coupled with the addition of a kitchen/diner extension. The two proposed east facing windows are approximately 8 meters and at an angle of 45°from my north facing lounge window. The applicant will have a line of sight through this window, across a section of my lounge and dining area, out through east facing French windows and on beyond over part of my patio. A further part of my patio and walkway will be in full outside view.

(2) Garages.

The pair of freestanding semi-detached garages have stood as such for over 40 years. For thirty years I have used part of the garage as a hobby work area without causing any nuisance whatsoever. A bench, tools and shelving etc. are attached to the party wall, the other side of which is the proposed lounge.

(3) west elevation.

The two garages form a balanced well proportioned unit. The proposed kitchen/diner extension will increase the frontage by over 50%. I feel that this, despite the slight lowering of the roof line, will create a 'row' effect to the detriment of the property and the area as a whole.

In conclusion,

I have no wish to obstruct the development of the existing bed/sit holiday accommodation. Looking at the proposed groundfloor plans and the spare land round them, I feel sure that excellent improvements could be made without the need for a first floor storey.
