Site Description and Proposed Development

This is an application to remove one leylandii tree that grows within the domestic garden of the property known as The White House on the garrison.

The tree has limited visibility in the street scene, with some wider views of the trees from open water to the north, and from the footpath that runs to the south side. The tree is located on the boundary between the White House and the property to the west known as Spindrift. The tree has limited amenity value largely restricted to the domestic gardens of the two properties.

Tree Assessment

The Leylandii or Leyland Cypress tree is a boundary evergreen tree common in the UK and North America, is not considered to be an important part of the wider historic built environment and felling a large boundary tree would not give rise to significant harm. The trees can grow rapidly and can provide shelter to many garden birds, who may also nest in it. However, the tree is protected due to the wider character of the conservation area as opposed to its biodiversity value, and a domestic hedge plant such as a leylandii is not considered to be significant in terms of the wider character of the Garrison and holds only limited amenity value. On this basis the proposed felling is considered acceptable and it is not recommended that the council designate a TPO.
